SUPERINTENDENT OF THE YEAR \* 2020

#### <u>PURPOSE</u>

Since 1984, the Superintendent of the Year (SOTY) award program has honored outstanding administrators for achievement and excellence in public school administration. These school leaders exhibit exemplary and visionary leadership toward improving student performance. They are chosen for their strong leadership skills, dedication to improving the quality of education in their districts, and commitment to public support and involvement in education.

# ELIGIBILITY AND NOMINATIONS

A local school board that is currently an "Active Member" of the Texas Association of School Boards (TASB) may nominate its superintendent. Nominees must meet the following requirements:

- ★ Have served as a superintendent of the district since September 1, 2017 (interim positions do not count)
- ★ Be a member of the Texas Association of School Administrators (TASA)
- ★ Be certified and meet the State Board for Educator Certification continuing professional education requirement
- ★ Be an active superintendent at the time of the 2020 TASA/TASB Convention

Superintendents who receive the top state award cannot be nominated again during the following five-year period. This rule does not apply to superintendents who were named regional winners or state finalists.

#### ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

**Recommendation Letter.** In a letter of recommendation addressed to the SOTY Selection Committee, the school board president should cite examples of the superintendent's leadership, while expanding on the following topics:

- ★ Leadership, Management, and School Climate
- ★ School Board-Superintendent Relations
- ★ School Improvement and Instructional Leadership
- ★ Fiscal Management
- ★ School-Community Relations

At the end of the letter, succinctly explain "Why our superintendent should be selected as Superintendent of the Year."

Nomination Packet. Be sure to include the following:

- 1. Official Entry Form
- 2. Student Performance Work Sheet
- 3. The letter, signed by the board president (no longer than five pages, 12-point Times New Roman, 1.5-line spacing, and 1-inch margins)
- 4. A basic resume listing current positions and professional organizations (no more than three pages)
- 5. A resolution indicating the board's decision to nominate the superintendent (remember to place the resolution on the board meeting agenda early in the process)

A photo of the superintendent also should be attached  $(8.5 \times 11^{\circ}, 300 \text{ dpi}, .jpg \text{ file format}).$ 

No other documentation will be accepted.

**Submission.** Send nominations to the executive director of the district's education service center (ESC). The packet documents should be scanned and submitted as a single PDF in the order listed above. The packet and photo must be e-mailed to the ESC by close of business April 10.

#### SELECTION PROCEDURE

**TASB Regional Screening Committees.** The ESC will coordinate the regional screening. School board members serving on the regional screening committee are from districts that do not have superintendents nominated for the award and do not have board members on the TASB State Selection Committee. Each regional screening committee will submit one nomination to the TASB State Selection Committee.

**TASB State Selection Committee.** The State Selection Committee is typically composed of members of the TASB Board of Directors appointed by the TASB president to serve on the TASB Member Services Committee. A TASB director may not serve if the superintendent from his or her district is being considered.

#### **AWARD**

The district of the Superintendent of the Year winner receives a \$5,000 award, which will be presented at the 2020 TASA/TASB Convention in Dallas. The award program is underwritten by Balfour and sponsored by TASB. The winner also receives a ring from Balfour. The districts of the four state finalists each receive \$1,000.

For LEAs contacting TEA by April 24, 2020, to request an extension, Federal Fiscal Compliance Division staff will work with you individually to determine your timeline for submission and final compliance determination being issued.

#### Do Not Remit Refunds

Your LEA must not remit refunds to TEA based on the preliminary IDEA-B LEA MOE compliance review. TEA will notify you in the final compliance review report if your LEA owes a refund and provide additional information at that time.

#### Department of Review and Support Special Education Newsletter Updates

The Department of Review and Support recognizes the immediate need to obtain information regarding the impact of local education agency (LEA) closures on Differentiated Monitoring and Support (DMS) activities scheduled for Spring 2020.

The information below provides details to local education agencies (LEAs) on how DMS monitoring activities will be modified to meet their needs.

- Cyclical Reviews Cycle I Group III LEAs scheduled to engage in Differentiated Monitoring and Support (DMS) cyclical monitoring activities to occur between the months of April and June will be postponed until Fall 2020. LEAs will receive monitoring notifications prior to August 2020 to discuss rescheduling Cycle I Group III monitoring activities.
- Differentiated Monitoring and Support (DMS) Stakeholder Survey As of March 20, 2020, the Department of Review and Support has received approximately 2800 individual responses to the Cycle I Group II stakeholder survey conducted during comprehensive desk reviews. To ensure LEAs can focus on supporting students and staff during school closures, the survey window will close on March 23, 2020 as scheduled. For LEAs who have not had an opportunity to complete the survey, there will be no requirement to do so. The agency will use the qualitative data collected prior to closures as information provided to LEAs in the report.
- Targeted Desk Reviews LEAs identified and scheduled to engage in a targeted desk review during Spring 2020 and have submitted student records to the Department of Review and Support will receive information regarding next steps after April 3, 2020.
  - LEAs identified and scheduled to engage in a targeted desk review during Spring 2020 and did not submit student records prior to March 16, 2020 to the Department of Review and Support will receive information regarding postponements to DMS monitoring activities (to begin Fall 2020) after April 3, 2020.
- Targeted On-site Reviews LEAs identified and scheduled to receive a targeted on-site review during Spring 2020 or Fall 2020 have been canceled.
- Strategic Support Plan (SSP) Teleconferences Teleconferences scheduled between March 16, 2020 and April 3, 2020 to support the development and implementation of the SSP have been suspended. SSP expectations for implementation and completion

remain; however, LEAs will receive notifications regarding next steps and extending submission timelines after April 3, 2020.

Corrective Action Plan (CAP) Teleconferences -Teleconferences scheduled between
March 16, 2020 and April 3, 2020 to support the development and implementation of
CAPs have been suspended. CAP expectations for implementation, timelines, and
completion remain; however, LEAs will receive notifications regarding next steps and
extending submission timelines after April 3, 2020. Please note, in accordance with
OSEP, LEAs must correct noncompliance and submit supporting documentation to the
Department of Review and Support no later than one year of written notification of
noncompliance.

During the time of school closures, Review and Support staff is available to assist LEAs in fulfilling monitoring requirements.

#### **COVID-19, School Closures, and E-Rate**

The early threat of COVID-19 has already led to a rash of school closings throughout the United States in what could lead to what one expert described as "a vast unplanned experiment in home schooling." Although E-rate provides limited financial support for virtual schools, there is little in the current funding rules to assist traditional schools in quickly transitioning to a remote learning environment.

Last week, two FCC Commissioners, <u>Jessica Rosenworcel</u> and <u>Geoffrey Starks</u>, both suggested emergency steps that the FCC could take in a number of its programs to support "telework, telehealth, and tele-education." In the educational arena, both Commissioners focused on funding to "rapidly increase the number of lendable hotspots available through schools and libraries."

E-rate funding of mobile hotspots would be a step in the right direction but falls far short of addressing all the remote technology issues schools will be facing in the coming weeks and months. In particular:



- 1. Hotspots in student homes would need to be tied into wireless Internet services. Monthly data usage fees, even if assumed by schools and libraries, are not currently E-rate eligible.
- 2. Some form of device (laptop, tablet, etc.) is necessary for effective distance learning. Such devices have never been E-rate eligible.
- 3. Existing school Internet bandwidth may not be sufficient to support a large number of concurrent remote users. Additional bandwidth, if properly deployed (essentially making regular schools into virtual schools), would be E-rate eligible. To provide E-rate funding, however, the FCC would have to further extend or reopen the application window for FY 2020 (and the remainder of FY 2019).
- 4. Most schools would have to fund, procure, and implement LMS (Learning Management System) software. Such software has never been E-rate eligible.

Besides funding mobile hotspots, other actions that the FCC should consider, at least temporarily, include:

• Supporting off-campus Internet access for students in lower-income families.



- Encouraging service provider provision of free or reduced-priced equipment and/or services by easing gift rules and Lowest Corresponding Price ("LCP") restrictions.
- Opening a second filing window that would allow applicants to refile for funding once a true assessment of their needs has been determined.

As of the end of last week, we began to see requests of this nature being made to the FCC. We expect to see a number of additional requests being filed this week.

FCC Chairman Ajit Pai, to his credit, announced last Friday that he had launched the Keep Americans Connected Pledge program and has been personally asking broadband and telephone service providers (and their trade associations), apparently with great success, for a 60-day voluntarily agreement to:

- 1. Not terminate service to residential or small business customers because of their inability to pay their bills due to the disruptions caused by the coronavirus pandemic;
- 2. Waive any late fees that residential or small business customers incur because of their economic circumstances related to the coronavirus pandemic; and
- 3. Open their Wi-Fi hotspots to any American who needs them.



#### FCC Public Notice on Community Use

On March 23, 2020, the FCC released a public notice (DA 20-234) to remind schools and libraries that are closed due to the coronavirus COVID-19 outbreak that they are permitted to allow the general public to use E-rate-supported Wi-Fi networks while on the school's campus or library property.

Libraries can allow the public to access E-rate funded services even when they are closed to the public due to the coronavirus pandemic. Similarly, closed schools may allow access to E-rate—funded services to community members who access the internet while on a school's campus so long as the schools do not charge for the use of the service.

Individual schools and libraries can establish their own policies regarding use of their Wi-Fi networks during closures, including hours of use.

#### What is E-rate?

E-rate: Universal Service Program for Schools and Libraries:

The FCC's E-rate program makes information services more affordable for schools and libraries. With funding from the Universal Service Fund, E-rate provides discounts for Internet access and internal connections to eligible schools and libraries. The ongoing proliferation of innovative digital learning technologies and the need to connect students, teachers and consumers to jobs, life-long learning and information have led to a steady rise in demand for bandwidth in schools and libraries. In recent years, the FCC refocused E-rate from legacy telecommunications services to broadband, with a goal to significantly expand Wi-Fi access. These steps to modernize the program are helping E-rate keep pace with the need for increased Internet access. Eligible schools and libraries may receive discounts on Internet access, as well as internal connections, managed internal broadband services and basic maintenance of internal connections. Discounts range from 20



to 90 percent, with higher discounts for higher poverty and rural schools and libraries. Recipients must pay some portion of the service costs.





#### How many schools hit with a Data Breach in 2019 until now

During 2019, there have been 348 publicly-disclosed school incidents, including student and staff data breaches, ransomware and other malware outbreaks, phishing attacks and other social engineering scams, denial-of-service attacks, and a wide variety of other incidents. According to K-12 Cybersecure, "This is nearly 3 times as many incidents as were publicly-disclosed during 2018 (and the most since the K-12 Cyber Incident Map first started tracking these incidents in 2016)." This equates to a rate of nearly two incidents per school day over the course of 2019. From 2016 until now there have been 799 school districts that had a cybersecurity incident. From January 2020 to March 2020 there have been 149 data breaches so far. Below is a pie chart from K-12 Cybersecure of the cybersecurity incidents school had and the percentage of what they experienced.

#### What is TSDS????????????????

The Texas Student Data System is a suite of applications that will improve education data collection in the state of Texas, and equip educators with timely, actionable, and historical student data.

#### What is TEDS??????

All validations used in TSDS are listed in the Texas Education Data Standards in Section 3 and 5. (TEDS)

#### What is TSDS Unique ID???????

TSDS Unique ID is necessary in order to integrate the various subsystems of TSDS smoothly and accurately – it if better able to reduce duplicates and other errors than TEA's previous identification management system.

LEAs use Unique ID numbers to load student and staff information to the TSDS Education Data Warehouse (EDW). Each student and staff member will have a single <u>unique 10-digit identifier</u> for his or her entire career within the Texas educational system (from early education programs through the twelfth grade). Individuals will retain the same unique identifier even if they leave the Texas education system and return years later or transition from being a student to a staff member.

All student/staff additions and changes must be made through Unique ID.

All LEAs must have UIDs for their students and staff to submit data for all collections.

#### **TSDS Required Trainings:**

**TSDS PEIMS Training** – This training provides participants the knowledge on how to get your data into the Validation Tool to the Data Transfer Utility, To the Data Manager, to the TSDS PEIMS Application

**TSDS ECDS Training**— Early Childhood Data System
This is to provide participants the knowledge on how to get your Kindergarten and Pre-K data uploaded into the TSDS system.

**TSDS Unique ID** – This training provides the most up to date information on the Unique ID process and how to use the application.

TSDS TIMS – TSDS Incident Management Escalation Process
This training explains how a district person writes a ticket after
calling the ESC and the problem is escalated to TEA. TEA
requires a ticket system for workflow. The district must begin
the ticket and escalate the ticket to Level 2 (ESC), we then
escalate to Level 3 (TEA) for further assistance.

- Core Collections the application that houses all other TEA data collection in TSDS, such as the Early Childhood Data System (ECDS), SPPI-14, Residential Facility (RF) Tracker.
- Texas Education Data Standards TEDS provides specifications for loading LEA educational data into the EDW for reporting and analysis purposes. TEDS is based on the national Ed-Fi standards and is more expandable and widely compatible than the legacy PEIMS standards

#### What is the TPEIR?

The Texas P-20 Public Education Information Resource is a longitudinal data warehouse that links students from pre-K through enrollment and graduation from Texas colleges (P-20). It is managed by TEA in partnership with the Texas Higher Education Coordination Board.

In addition to **20+ years** of P-12 and higher education data from Texas colleges and universities and information on teacher certification and teacher preparation programs, the warehouse has been expanded to link critical missing **pre-kindergarten**, **college readiness**, **and workforce** (wage, industry, and employment) data.

Mike presented the upcoming RUS Grant for the amount of one million dollars. He stated that Christy Cate and Shawn Schlueter are working on innovative areas we can offer to districts. Areas such as robotics, mobile lab, glow forge, 3D printing, Google Expedition Kits, and other portable options to transport to schools. One of the main focuses has been the success of the MakerSpace. Robb mentioned the idea of being able to offer a mobile makerspace. Shane Fields and



Robb spoke about the possibility of contacting local auto-dealerships and giving them advertising space on the mobile unit. Robb will be sending out an email to the superintendents requesting interests and feedback. DL components and equipment were also discussed.

In 2009, the annual budget of the WTTC was \$2,246,882. Members paid 8.77% of this cost which was \$196,970. The rest of the budget was paid for by 41/42 funds (\$494,881) and E-Rate (\$1,555,031). As a comparison, the 2020-21 budget should be around \$1,400,000 (which includes \$400,000 in major purchases for networking equipment). Without the purchases, the budget would be around \$1,000,000 annually, which is \$1,246,882 less than it was in 2009.

In 2009, we had a wireless ring network with 150 meg of bandwidth rings and 50 meg to the spurs. Our combined Internet ability was 80 meg. Now, we have a fiber ring, with every school have a gigabit connection and the capability of up to 10 gig to the Internet (with typically use just a little more than 3 gig daily). Also in 2009, we had 2 instructional technologists that did in training at the region center and traveled to the districts. Now we have 3 instructional technologists, a maker space lab and are working on a mobile maker space lab along with the trainings as before.

Just to recap, we have cut our expenses by 55.5% since 2009. We've increased out instructional technology staff by 33%, added a maker space lab that schools love, increased our WAN capacity by 85% and our Internet bandwidth by 98.5% all while having state of the art protection for our schools.

All of this is because the WTTC Board of Directors, in around 2012, decided that the burden on schools would be too great if the 41/42 funding went away as soon as 2014 as it was on track to do. So, beginning at that time, a shift began to increase slightly each year the amount schools paid versus how much was withdrawn from 41/42 funds which extended the funds until the 2019-2020 school year. In the chart below, you can see the shifting percentages. It should also be noted that many costs cuts were also made. In late 2016, Governor Abott, along with the FCC and USAC introduced a game changer.

Before this change, the future expenses of the WTTC was bleak even with the efforts of the board. The demand for more bandwidth had led to the addition of fiber to 11 of the larger schools because the wireless system simply could not carry enough traffic despite an upgrade of its original configuration. The additional fiber did give enough bandwidth to those 11 schools and made things better for the remaining 30 schools on wireless and the cost was spread evenly for all of the districts. But this fiber came at an additional costs and the other 30 schools were going to max out the wireless bandwidth. With waning 41/42 funds, things did not look good.

Then, in 2016, the Texas Classroom Connectivity Grant was announced which would pay 10% of fiber costs for districts and consortiums. The FCC announced it would match whatever the state paid. With our USAC percentage of 77% to 78%, this meant we could potentially build a network for 2 to 3% on the dollar and have enough bandwidth for all of our schools. Things were looking better. The WTTC Board decided to be the first consortium to attempt to utilize this type of endeavor.

It took about 3 years for the fiber to be fully installed. Now every school has a gigabit connection that is not shared as was the 150 meg connections in 2009. Also, this is a redundant path network which means every school has the Internet coming from 2 different directions. The best part is that the WAN connection cost of \$339,710 in 2009 that had climbed to \$445,970 in 2018 is now \$65,067. This drop of \$380,000 almost equals what we were spending out of 41/42 funds annually, which makes the WTTC self-sustaining from this point on.

So yes, the actual costs to schools has gone up from \$196,970 in 2009 to around \$1,400,000 now, but that is still less than the actual costs of services of \$2,246,882 in 2009. Instead of paying less than 10%

of the total costs, schools are now paying 98% of the total cost without having to worry about running out of 41/42 funds. We now have vastly improved Internet service, a state of the art Maker Space and more training staff. When compared to the cost increases at the local level, or even at the home level, since 2009, I think we have done pretty well thanks to the foresight of the WTTC Board. A lot more demand at a greatly reduced cost overall seems to be a pretty good deal.

#### **Performance Reporting News**

**A–F Accountability**: The Texas Education Agency (TEA) continues to work with the Office of the Governor, Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) and the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to coordinate and plan the state's response to COVID-19. Through statutory authority, Governor Greg Abbott has <u>suspended the administration of STAAR</u> testing scheduled for April, May, and June 2020. <u>Executive Order no. GA-08</u> has ordered public schools to remain closed to students through April 3, 2020, unless that period is extended by the governor.

Statewide school closure and waiving STAAR testing requirements is unprecedented in recent history, and Performance Reporting has received several questions specific to disruptions caused by COVID-19. In order to address questions raised during this rapidly changing situation, the agency has created the <a href="Coronavirus (COVID-19">COVID-19</a>) support and guidance website as the primary source of up-to-date information and answers to frequently asked questions about disruptions caused by COVID-19.

The agency has also created a dedicated email address for all COVID-19 questions—
disasterinfo@tea.texas.gov. Using this email, rather than emailing individual departments is be the best way to ensure the agency tracks questions and responds in a timely manner.

#### **Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Waiver Request**

TEA has asked the U.S. Department of Education (USDE) to waive the assessment and accountability requirements under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), for the 2019–2020 school year. Texas is requesting that for the 2019–2020 school year, federal assessment, accountability, and federal identification of schools for improvement requirements be waived in recognition of the unprecedented impact of COVID-19.

The approval of this waiver would not break the chain of consecutive years of low performance under section ESSA, 1111(b)(4)(D). #### Alternative Education Accountability (AEA) Registration

Due to the impact of COVID-19 on districts across the state, the 2020 AEA campus registration process for the state academic accountability system has been rescheduled for April 27 to May 8, 2020. Campuses rated by 2019 AEA provisions are reregistered automatically in 2020, provided that the campus continues to meet enrollment and at-risk criteria as determined by TSDS PEIMS October snapshot data. New this year, campuses that were not registered in 2019 but meet eligibility in 2020 will be automatically registered for AEA by the agency. Districts may choose to remove a campus from evaluation under AEA procedures by submitting an AEA rescission form through the TEA Login (TEAL) Accountability application. Additional instructions for the rescission request will be provided before the AEA window opens.



## Why would an administrator want to have the staff study






