

TEA TEA Recommendation for School Safety

Recommended Use of Funds for School Safety

The federal grant has many allowable uses that fall within the broad categories of 1) wellrounded education opportunities, 2) safe and healthy students, and 3) effective use of technology.

TEA has previously awarded Title IV, Part A, Subpart 1 grants to local educational agencies (LEAs) for many purposes that meet the LEA's identified needs, including school safety. Any increase in federal grant funds should be prioritized to immediately implement school safety improvements on campuses, including counseling and mental health programs, addressing ways to integrate health and safety practices into school or athletic programs, and disseminating best practices and evaluating program outcomes relating to any LEA activities to promote student safety and violence prevention.

A safe learning environment for all students is crucial to advancing the purposes of the SSAE program. TEA further requests LEAs to submit SSAE applications that prioritize increased spending on allowable school safety training and activities.

TEA Unallowable Use of Funds

Unallowable Use of Funds

Title IV, Part A, Subpart 1 programs, activities, and services which are also mandated by state law, rule, and regulation, the State Board of Education (SBOE) rule, or local board policy cannot be funded with Title IV, Part A grant funds.

Unallowable use of funds for this grant program include, but are not limited to, the following:

- suicide prevention training for personnel and specialized support personnel;
- mental health first aid training to fulfill required continuing education of personnel;
- well-rounded activities and competitions that are University Interscholastic League events; and
- nursing continuing education to fulfill yearly license renewal.



Yes. The evaluation of services and how the results will be used must be discussed during ongoing consultation meetings per the <u>ESEA</u>, <u>Participation by Private Schools and Teachers, Part F, Subpart 1, Section 8501(c)(1)(D) and ESEA, Title IV, Part A, Section 4106 (e)(1)(E).</u>





TEA PNP – Eligibility of PNP Students

Which private nonprofit students are eligible to receive Title IV, Part A equitable services?

Private school students enrolled in PNP elementary and secondary schools, including those in religiously affiliated schools, located in the LEA are eligible to receive services.



PNP – Title IV, Part A Eligibility of PNP Students

Is the residency of a private school student a factor that must be considered when determining whether a student is eligible to receive Title IV, Part A equitable services?

No. Students who are enrolled in private nonprofit elementary and secondary *schools located in areas served by an LEA* are eligible to receive Title IV, Part A equitable services.



PNP - Technology

May Title IV, Part A equitable services be used for participating PNP schools to purchase student laptops/electronics?

Yes.

All technology must be maintained in control of the district, in the district's inventory, and district monitored for only secular, neutral, and non-ideological uses.



PNP – Unexpended Funds for Equitable Services

If a PNP school has Title IV, Part A equitable services remaining and declines continued participation or closes, what happens with the remaining funds for services?

The unexpended funds for equitable services are considered additional funds for services in both public and participating PNP schools the subsequent year on an equitable basis.



PNP - Transferability/REAP and Equitable Services

When should LEAs calculate equitable shares if it plans to transfer or REAP Title IV, Part A funds?

Before an LEA may transfer or REAP funds, it must engage in timely and meaningful consultation with PNP school officials.

LEA must provide PNP school students and staff equitable services under the program(s) to/from which the funds are transferred or REAPed based on the amount of funds to each program.



PNP – Transferability/REAP and Equitable Services (continued)

If an LEA transfers or REAPs 100% of Title IV, Part A funds, is it still required to consult with stakeholders and private school officials?

Yes.

No.

Title IV, Part A: Student Support and **Academic Enrichment**

The Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as reauthorized by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) of 2015, established Title IV, Part A, the Student Support and Academic Enrichment Grant Program (SSAE). The overarching goal of Title IV, Part A, is to increase the capacity of state education agencies, local educational agencies (LEAs), campuses, and communities to meet the following three goals:

- 1. Provide all students access to a well-rounded education
- 2. Improve academic outcomes by maintaining safe and healthy students
- 3. Improve the use of technology to advance student academic achievement

LEA Requirements

- 1. LEAs must complete and submit to TEA the ESSA Consolidated Federal Grant Application to receive ESSA Title IV, Part A, program allocations.
- 2. An LEA may, if it chooses, apply for funds in consortium with one or more surrounding LEAs and combine funds each LEA receives.
- 3. LEAs receiving \$30,000 or more shall conduct a comprehensive needs assessment of the access to, and opportunities for, a well-rounded education for all students; school conditions for student learning; and access to personalized learning experiences supported by technology.
- 4. LEAs receiving less than \$30,000
 - a. are NOT required to conduct a comprehensive needs assessment and

b. are only required to focus on one of the three Title IV, Part A, content areas: 1) well-rounded education, 2) safe and healthy students, and 3) effective use of technology.

5. LEAs may transfer Title IV, Part A, funds to another federal allocation. For guidance, see Non-Regulatory Guidance: Fiscal Changes and Equitable Services Requirements.
