

Title IV, Part A, Subpart 1, Student Support and Academic Enrichment grants are designed to *improve the academic achievement of all students* by increasing the capacity of LEAs, schools, and communities to:





TEA TEA Recommendation

Recommended Use of Funds for School Safety

The federal grant has many allowable uses that fall within the broad categories of 1) wellrounded education opportunities, 2) safe and healthy students, and 3) effective use of technology.

TEA has previously awarded Title IV, Part A, Subpart 1 grants to local educational agencies (LEAs) for many purposes that meet the LEA's identified needs, including school safety. Any increase in federal grant funds should be prioritized to immediately implement school safety improvements on campuses, including counseling and mental health programs, addressing ways to integrate health and safety practices into school or athletic programs, and disseminating best practices and evaluating program outcomes relating to any LEA activities to promote student safety and violence prevention.

A safe learning environment for all students is crucial to advancing the purposes of the SSAE program. TEA further requests LEAs to submit SSAE applications that prioritize increased spending on allowable school safety training and activities.



Internet Safety: Title IV, Part A, Subpart 2

The LEA shall adhere to all requirements of the ESSA <u>Title IV, Part A, Subpart 2, Section</u> <u>4121 Internet Safety (20 U.S.C. 7131)</u> statute.

Below is a *summary* of the Internet Safety requirements:

No funds made available under Title IV, Part A, Subpart 1 to an LEA for an elementary school or secondary school that does not receive services at discount rates under the <u>Communications Act of 1934 (47 U.S.C. 254(h)(5))</u> may be used to purchase computers, used to access the internet, or to pay for direct costs associated with accessing the internet for such school unless the school, school board, LEA, or other authority with responsibility for administration of such school does the following:



Internet Safety: Title IV, Part A, Subpart 2 (continued)

1. Policy of Internet safety for minors that includes the operation of a technology protection measure with respect to any of its computers with internet access that protects against access through such computers to visual depictions that are obscene, are child pornography, or are harmful to minors, and is enforcing the operation of such technology protection measure during any use of such computers by minors; and



Internet Safety: Title IV, Part A, Subpart 2 (continued)

2. **Policy of Internet safety that includes the operation of a technology protection measure** with respect to any of its computers with internet access that protects against access through such computers to visual depictions that are obscene or child pornography and is enforcing the operation of such technology protection measure during any use of such computers.

An LEA shall certify its compliance with these requirements annually upon submission of the ESSA Consolidated Application.



Non-Smoking Policy* (summary)

ESSA Consolidated Plan Application Program-Specific and ESSA Provisions and Assurances

No person shall permit smoking within any indoor facility owned or leased or contracted for and utilized by such person for provision of routine or regular kindergarten, elementary, or secondary education or library services to children.

Smoking shall not be allowed within any indoor facility (or portion of such a facility) owned or leased or contracted for, and utilized by, such person for the provision of regular or routine health care or day care or early childhood education programs.

Engage in timely and meaningful consultation with a broad range of required stakeholders in the area served by the LEA to identify relevant, evidence-based activities to carry out the goals of the grant program

An LEA must continue to consult with stakeholders to improve the activities it conducts under Title IV, Part A, Subpart 1 and coordinate with other related strategies, programs, and activities.



Allowable Use of Funds

Each LEA must be able to respond appropriately to and maintain documentation for each of the following questions to determine whether an expenditure would be allowable:

- 1. How is the expenditure **reasonable** and **necessary** to carry out the intent and purpose of the program?
- 2. What **need**, as identified in the comprehensive needs assessment, does the expenditure address? Explain how the expenditure addresses this need.
- 3. How will the expenditure be **evaluated** to measure a positive impact on student achievement?
- 4. How is the expenditure **supplemental** to other nonfederal programs?



TEA Unallowable Use of Funds

Unallowable Use of Funds

Title IV, Part A, Subpart 1 programs, activities, and services which are also mandated by state law, rule, and regulation, the State Board of Education (SBOE) rule, or local board policy cannot be funded with Title IV, Part A grant funds.

Unallowable use of funds for this grant program include, but are not limited to, the following:

- suicide prevention training for personnel and specialized support personnel;
- mental health first aid training to fulfill required continuing education of personnel;
- well-rounded activities and competitions that are University Interscholastic League events; and
- nursing continuing education to fulfill yearly license renewal.



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Title IV, Part A: Student Support and Academic Enrichment

The Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as reauthorized by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) of 2015, established Title IV, Part A, the Student Support and Academic Enrichment Grant Program (SSAE). The overarching goal of Title IV, Part A, is to increase the capacity of state education agencies, local educational agencies (LEAs), campuses, and communities to meet the following three goals:

- 1. Provide all students access to a well-rounded education
- 2. Improve academic outcomes by maintaining safe and healthy students
- 3. Improve the use of technology to advance student academic achievement

LEA Requirements

- 1. LEAs must complete and submit to TEA the ESSA Consolidated Federal Grant Application to receive ESSA Title IV, Part A, program allocations.
- 2. An LEA may, if it chooses, apply for funds in consortium with one or more surrounding LEAs and combine funds each LEA receives.
- 3. LEAs receiving \$30,000 or more shall conduct a comprehensive needs assessment of the access to, and opportunities for, a well-rounded education for all students; school conditions for student learning; and access to personalized learning experiences supported by technology.
- 4. LEAs receiving less than \$30,000
 - a. are NOT required to conduct a comprehensive needs assessment and

b. are only required to focus on one of the three Title IV, Part A, content areas: 1) well-rounded education, 2) safe and healthy students, and 3) effective use of technology.

5. LEAs may transfer Title IV, Part A, funds to another federal allocation. For guidance, see Non-Regulatory Guidance: Fiscal Changes and Equitable Services Requirements.
