



Program Intent and Purposes

Title IV, Part A, Subpart 1, Student Support and Academic Enrichment grants are designed to *improve the academic achievement of all students* by increasing the capacity of LEAs, schools, and communities to:



Prioritization of Services

LEAs must prioritize the distribution of funds for schools with:

- Greatest needs
- Highest percentages or numbers of students from low-income families (as counted for purposes of the LEA's Title I, Part A grant)
- Identification for comprehensive support and improvement under Title I, Part A
- Targeted support implementation and improvement plans under Title I, Part A; or
- Persistently dangerous public elementary or secondary school(s)





ESSA Consolidated Federal Grant Application Title IV, Part A Program Guidelines: School Safety

TEA recommends Title IV, Part A, federal grant funds be prioritized to implement:

- school safety on campuses;
- counseling and mental health programs;
- addressing ways to integrate health and safety practices into school or athletic programs;
- disseminating best practices; and
- evaluating program outcomes relating to any LEA activities to promote student safety and violence prevention.





ESSA Consolidated Federal Grant Application Title IV, Part A Program Guidelines: Program Description

The LEA will maintain a description of the activities and programming that the LEA will carry out, including a description of:

Any partnership with an institution of higher education, business, nonprofit organization, community-based organization, or other public or private entity with a demonstrated record of success in implementing activities

All required program descriptions are to be maintained locally and available upon request from TEA and/or an auditor.



ESSA Consolidated Federal Grant Application Title IV, Part A Program Guidelines: Program Description (continued)

- How funds will be used for activities related to supporting well-rounded education
- How funds will be used for activities related to supporting safe and healthy students
- How funds will be used for activities related to supporting the effective use of technology in schools







ESSA Consolidated Federal Grant Application Title IV, Part A Program Guidelines: Program Description (continued)

- Program objectives and intended outcomes for activities; and
- How the LEA will periodically evaluate the effectiveness of the activities carried out under this section based on such objectives and outcomes

Title IV, Part A - Use of Funds Criteria

Title IV, Part A, Subpart 1: Student Support and Academic Enrichment Grants Use of Funds

Statutory Reference*

Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), <u>Section 4110</u>. Funds made available under this subpart shall be used to supplement, and not supplant, non-Federal funds that would otherwise be used for activities authorized under this subpart.

Allowable Costs Criteria

- Ensure that the LEA has prioritized distribution of Title IV, Part A funds to applicable school campuses [ESSA, <u>Section</u> 4106(2)(A)]
- Ensure that the LEA has consulted with private nonprofit (PNP) schools [ESSA, Section 4106(2)(B)];
- Ensure that activities and/or resources are
 - Supplemental [ESSA, <u>Section 4110</u>];
 - Identified in required <u>Comprehensive Needs Assessment</u> which includes data and all <u>stakeholders</u> [ESSA, Sections 4106(2) and 4106(c)(1)];
 - The planning process meets the requirements for continued consultation of stakeholders and coordination [ESSA, Section 4106(c)(2)];
 - Reasonable;
 - Necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of the Title IV, Part A program;
 - Allocable; and
 - o Allowable under Title IV, Part A

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Purpose of Title IV, Part A, Program Guide

Intent and Purpose

Title IV, Part A, Subpart 1, Student Support and Academic Enrichment grants are designed to improve the academic achievement of all students by increasing the capacity of LEAs, schools, and communities to

- provide all students with access to a well-rounded education,
- (2) improve school conditions for student learning, and
- (3) improve technology in order to enhance academic outcomes and digital literacy of students.



Purpose of Well-Rounded Education

- Provides an enriched curriculum and education experiences to all students
- Starts with early learning opportunities that make time for exploration and continues with K-12 education
- Promotes a diverse set of learning experiences that engage students across a variety of courses, activities, and programs

- LEA must obtain prior written informed parental consent for mental

heath assessment or services



Purpose of Effective Use of Technology

- Improve academic achievement, academic growth, and digital literacy of all students
- Accelerate and expand the impact of effective practices that support student learning
- Increase community engagement
- Expand growth opportunities for all students
- Provide historically disadvantaged students greater equity of access

Evaluation of Title IV, Part A Program Effectiveness



Evaluation of Title IV, Part A Program Effectiveness

- Required for supported Title IV, Part A activities and/or programs
- Documented evaluation of program effectiveness every 3 years
 - Best Practice annual review of progress
 - Share evaluation results with parents
- Drives future Title IV, Part A activities and programs
 - LEAs must include parents in stakeholder group for feedback
- Most recent documentation available, upon TEA/Auditor's request



Program Evaluation –All Activities

Each LEA that receives Title IV, Part A, funds must meet the following program evaluation requirements.

- Periodically evaluate effectiveness of the activities to support the program objectives and intended outcomes
- Annually submit a report regarding how funds are used to meet the distribution requirements
- How the expenditure will be evaluated to measure a positive impact on student achievement



Program Evaluation –Travel

Must include an **evaluation** of the travel that measures the impact on **student achievement**



- Field trips
- Competitions
- Out-of-state travel



Additional Program Requirements: Title IV, Part A Educationally – Related Funded Travel

- Identified in the Comprehensive Needs Assessment (CNA)
- Included in the Campus Improvement Plan (CIP)
- Allocable, reasonable, necessary
- Positive impact on student achievement


- Includes instructional activity that cannot be conducted on campus
- Includes instruction that addresses the *Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills* (TEKS)
- Includes an evaluation measuring the impact on student achievement

Title IV, Part A, Subpart 1, Content Areas

Activities to Support Well-rounded education

The purpose of a well-rounded education is to provide an enriched curriculum and education experiences to all students.

Example activities include courses, activities, and programming in subjects such as English, reading or language arts, writing, science, technology, engineering, mathematics, foreign languages, civics and government, economics, arts, history, geography, computer science, music, career and technical education, health education, physical education, and any other allowable activity, as determined by the state or LEA.

Activities to Support School Conditions for Student Learning (Support Safe and Healthy Students)

One purpose of the Title IV, Part A programs are to improve school conditions for student learning.

Example activities include violence prevention, crisis management and conflict resolution, preventing human trafficking, building school and community relationships, healthy and safety practices, physical and mental health, counseling services, and any other allowable activity, as determined by the state or LEA.




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
