




#### Provides:

- Technical assistance to districts and ESCs
- Monitor + provide guidance
- Support implementation and operation of safety and security requirements







#### **Vulnerability Assessments**

- Facility access controls, EOP, and other safety requirements
- Results with recommendations and required corrective actions to Superintendent + School Safety and Security Committee.
- Any document or information collected, developed, or produced is confidential.









#### **Annual Intruder Detection Audits**

- School Safety Review Team at each ESC
- Every district must be checked annually
- Provide report with recommendations and required corrective actions
- Report confidential and not subject to disclosure







- Serve as a school safety resources for School Districts
- May assist Districts with:
  - Emergency Operations Plans
  - Establishing School Safety and Security Committee
  - Conducting emergency drills and exercises
  - Addressing reported deficiencies
  - Other school safety and security guidance
- Assist with Intruder Detection Assessments
- May assist Districts with positive behavioral interventions to enrolled student as part of an SSSP Team's behavioral threat assessment

### **School Safety Allotment**





## A school district is **entitled** to an **annual** allotment

- \$10 for each student
- plus \$1 for each student in average daily attendance per every \$50 by which the district's maximum basic allotment exceeds \$6,160,
- \$15,000 per campus

- fencing
- exterior door and window upgrades
- security cameras, other security equipment
- video surveillance
- technology, including communications systems
- security personnel
- suicide prevention programs
- employing a school safety director
- training to a person authorized carry a firearm on a campus

### **Keeping Texas Schools Safe**



- Sheriff to conduct county school safety meetings for rural counties 2x per year
- Team Members
  - Sheriff
  - PD Police chief
  - Constable
  - ISD Police Chief/security coordinator
  - DPS
  - EMS
  - Fire department
  - Superintendent
  - State agency with commissioned peace officers
  - Sheriff may choose others
  - Federal law officials in county

- Safety and Security Committee
- Bullying Committee (may be part of another)
- Student Health Advisory Council (SHAC)



### **Keeping Students Safe**







#### **Armed Response**

- At least 1 armed security officer present who has completed all required training
- A district good cause exception could allow for
  - School Marshal or Guardian
  - Must complete all required training

#### Reports:

 District maintains documentation of compliance and good cause exception



#### **School Administration**

- Weekly Door Checks
- 2x Annual Safety Standards Maintenance checks
- SPAT Communication Checks
- Monthly Drills & Exercises

#### Reports

 Maintain Door Log, 2x Annual Safety Standards Maintenance check, drill logs, and other safety security documentation and provide to TEA and other auditors upon request.

### **Keeping Students Safe**



- Each facility must comply with TEA's minimal facility standards
- District must develop and maintain documentation of standards
- If unable to comply district must claim a good cause exception and develop an alternative performance standard

### **Keeping Students and Facilities Safe**



Follow TEA guidelines for students/personnel with **disabilities or impairments** during a disaster or emergency situation



Submit Emergency Operation Plan and requested annexes to TxSSC for review.



Conduct a safety and security audit of district facilities and ensuring the auditor is on the TxSSC best practice registry





### **Keeping Students and Facilities Safe**



Maps: Provide Law enforcement agencies and emergency first responders an accurate map of all campuses including site floor plans, access control, and exterior door numbering.



**SPAT:** Provide each classroom with silent panic alert technology that allows for immediate contact with

- district or school emergency services
- law enforcement agencies, health departments, fire departments, and 911
- If 911 is called then it must trigger the Silent Panic Alert System (School Safety Standards)

Must be implemented by 2025-2026 school year



### **Keeping Students and Facilities Safe**



#### Identification

A district may require a person who enters property

- to display the person's driver's license or another form of ID
- district employee or student identification card.
- the person must provide the identification on request



#### **District Right to Eject**

A district may eject a person from district property if:

- the person refuses or fails to provide on request identification; and
- it reasonably appears that the person has no legitimate reason to be on district property



TEC 38.022, HB 3





#### **Armed Security Officer Required**

- At least one armed security officer is present during regular school hours at each campus. The security officer must be a
  - school district police officer
  - a school resource officer
  - or a commissioned peace officer employed as security personnel under TEC 37.081
- If unable to provide due to cost or availability the board may claim a *good cause* exception and *develop alternative standards*.

#### **Active Shooter Response Training**



- District peace officer or SRO shall complete a TCOLE active shooter response training program.
- Requirement takes effect 12/1/2024



#### **Alternative** Armed Security

If good cause exception and alternative standard claimed, it may include providing a person to act as a security officer who is a

School Marshal or School Guardian

A school district must develop and maintain documentation and if requested provide that documentation to TEA.





A peace officer performing law enforcement or school security personnel performing related duties on school property or at a school-sponsored or school-related activity

may not restrain or use a chemical irritant spray or Taser on a student enrolled in grade 5 or < unless the student poses a serious risk of harm to the student or another person.





The definition of "authorized peace officer" now includes

- a peace officer commissioned for a school district or secondary educational institutions and adds additional authority
- Revision allows school district peace officer, SRO, and security personnel to apply for or be issued certain search warrant related to digital communications

### **Keeping Sporting Officials Safe**



#### **Prohibition from Attending District & UIL Event**

A spectator (including a parent of a participant) of an extracurricular athletic activity or competition, that engages in conduct that causes bodily injury to a person serving as referee, judge, or other official shall be **prohibited from attending any activity or competition for** 

no less than 1 year and no more than 5 years.



### **Keeping Sporting Officials Safe**



#### **Provide Personnel to Ensure Safety**

A district that holds an extracurricular athletic activity/UIL athletic competition on district property shall provide a peace officer, SRO, an administrator, or security personnel to ensure the safety of competition officials until the official departs if:

- a participant/spectator engages in, attempts to engage in, or threatens
   violent conduct against the official or disrupts the duties or free movement
   of the official; or
- the district or school *reasonably suspects* that an incident may occur at the activity or competition.



### **Keeping Students Safe**



 Each district must establish a clear procedure for a student to report concerning behavior exhibited by another student to the SSSP | Behavioral Threat Assessment Team.



Materials and Information produced from a threat assessment of a student must be maintained in a **student's school record until the student's 24th birthday.** 



### **Keeping Students Safe**



**Exception:** child is actively participating in swim instruction or a competition that is closely supervised

#### **Child Water Safety**

Before any child under 12 engages in an organized water activity shall:

- Requires parents to affirm in writing whether the child is able to swim
  or is at risk of injury or death when swimming
- If child is unable to swim
  - District must provide to each child who is unable to swim or is at risk of injury or death a properly fitted and fastened Type I, II, or III US Coast Guard approved personal flotation device and
  - District must ensure the child is wearing the personal flotation device and the device is properly fitted and fastened for the child.

### **Keeping Employees Safe**



- A district employee who reports a potential threat may elect for their identity to be confidential except as necessary to investigate the potential threat
- Only the original reporter can maintain confidentiality
- The district will maintain a record of employee's identity







#### **DAEP for E-Cigarette (Vape) and Certain Drugs**

A student shall be removed from class and placed in a disciplinary alternative education program (DAEP) if the student:

- Possesses, uses a controlled substance or dangerous drug
- Possesses, uses, or is under the influence of, sells, gives, or delivers to another person
  - Marihuana or tetrahydrocannabinol
  - E-cigarette
  - Alcohol
  - Abusable volatile chemical
- May transfer student to ISS if DAEP is at capacity







#### It is a Hazing Offense if a person:

- engages in hazing;
- solicits, encourages, directs, aids, or attempts to aid another in engaging in hazing;
- recklessly permits hazing to occur; or
- Fails to report in writing to officials their knowledge of the planning or that a hazing incident has occurred

IF A PERSON KNOWING OF AN INCIDENT VOLUNTARILY REPORTS TO DISTRICT OR LAW ENFORCEMENT <u>BEFORE</u> BEING CONTACTED BY OFFICIALS, THEY ARE IMMUNE FROM CIVIL OR CRIMINAL LIABILITY.





#### A Person Commits a Harassment Offense

- the person makes obscene, intimidating, or threatening telephone calls or other electronic communications from a temporary or disposable telephone number provided by an Internet application or other technological means (ex. Web App) with
- intent to harass, annoy, alarm, abuse, torment, or embarrass another person







#### **Hair Texture or Protective Hairstyle - The CROWN Act**

In this section, "protective hairstyle" includes braids, locks, and twists.

Any student dress or grooming policy, including a student dress or grooming policy for any extracurricular activity,

<u>may not</u> discriminate against a hair texture or protective hairstyle commonly or historically associated with race.





#### **Enrollment of Student**

The parent or sending school shall furnish to the receiving district a copy of the child's records from most recent school, including a copy of the child's disciplinary records and any threat assessment(s) involving the child's behavior.



#### **Transfer of Student**

In the case of a transfer, a child's school district of residence shall provide the receiving district with the child's disciplinary records and any threat assessment(s) conducted.



### **Keeping Parents Informed**



#### **Notification of SSSP Behavioral Threat Assessment**

**Before:** The team must **notify** the parent of or person standing in parental relation to the student regarding the assessment.

**During:** Team shall provide **an opportunity** for the parent or person to **participate** in the assessment and to submit to the team information regarding the student.

After: Team shall provide to the parent the team's findings and conclusions regarding the student.

TEC 37.115, HB 473

### **Keeping Parents Informed**



#### **Notification Regarding Violent Activity**

Districts must provide notice regarding **violent activity** that **has occurred** or **is being investigated** at a school campus or other LEA facility to parents and/or guardians of students assigned to the campus.

#### The Standards must:

- 1. Include electronic notification through text messaging and email
- 2. Provide option for real-time notification, and
- 3. Protect student privacy

# Parent Awareness of Firearm Storage

Secure all firearms from children < 17 years old.

#### Safe Firearm Storage Resources

Information for School Districts and Open-Enrollment Charter Schools to Assist with New Legislative Requirements

House Bill 3, Section 19 (88th Texas Legislature) adds Section 37.222 to the Texas Education Code, which requires the Texas School Safety Center, in collaboration with the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS), to provide to each school district and open-enrollment charter school information and other resources regarding the safe storage of firearms, including information on section 46.13 of the Texas Penal Code, for distribution by the district or school.

The Texas DPS has created a public relations campaign – Keep 'Em Safe Texas – that offers free downloadable resources to promote safe gun storage.

Districts must provide this information to the parent or guardian of each student enrolled in the district or school. The Texas School Safety Center recommends districts provide this information twice annually – once at the beginning of the school year and once at the end of the school year.

Below you will find links to resources in English and Spanish to assist districts with meeting this legislative mandate. Districts may select the resources and formats that best fit their needs.



### **Keeping Students Safe**



**CPS reports are confidential, but no longer anonymous.** The individual making a report shall identify their name and address.

If a report of abuse or neglect is made orally, the receiver must notify

- the one making the report that the report is being recorded
- making a false report is a criminal offense punishable as a state jail felony or a third degree felony
- make an audio recording of the report

**Before** taking any action CPS must provide to a parent of a child who is under investigation

- information regarding the CPS representative's identity
- the summary of the report
- a reasonable amount of time to read or review the summary




